Concept Note and Agenda

I. Background

The upcoming side event on diaspora engagement policies and the role of civil society and diaspora organizations takes place within the framework of the Second Regional Review of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration (GCM) in Africa. Recent trends in Africa emphasize the growing formalization of diaspora engagement policies, supported by frameworks such as Agenda 2063 and GCM objective 19 promoting diaspora contributions to sustainable development. African governments are at different stages of developing, reviewing or implementing their diaspora engagement strategies. The event will explore how diaspora and civil society can collaborate with governments to shape effective migration governance related to diaspora engagement. This is in line with GCM's whole-of-society approach, which promotes the active participation of diverse stakeholders.

II. Description and Objectives

We will explore Diaspora Engagement Policies and the crucial role of local civil society and the diaspora in shaping these policies. This virtual event brings together diverse perspectives from Ghana, Cameroon, and Ethiopia and their diaspora communities, featuring insights from government partners, civil society organisations, researchers, and international organisations. It allows for insights into the different phases of Diaspora Engagement Policies – development, review and implementation – and the specific role CSOs and diaspora organizations can play in each of these.

The objectives of this event are to:

- Share best practices on developing, reviewing and implementing diaspora engagement policies in Africa
- Highlight entry points and different roles civil society and diaspora organisations can play in the diaspora policy process
- Distil key opportunities and challenges on diaspora organisation and government collaboration, as well as other CSO actors.

IV. Speakers

Marianne HAASE, Head of Component MEG, GIZ (introductory remarks): Marianne Haase leads a component at the Programme "Shaping Development-Oriented Migration" at GIZ in Germany.
